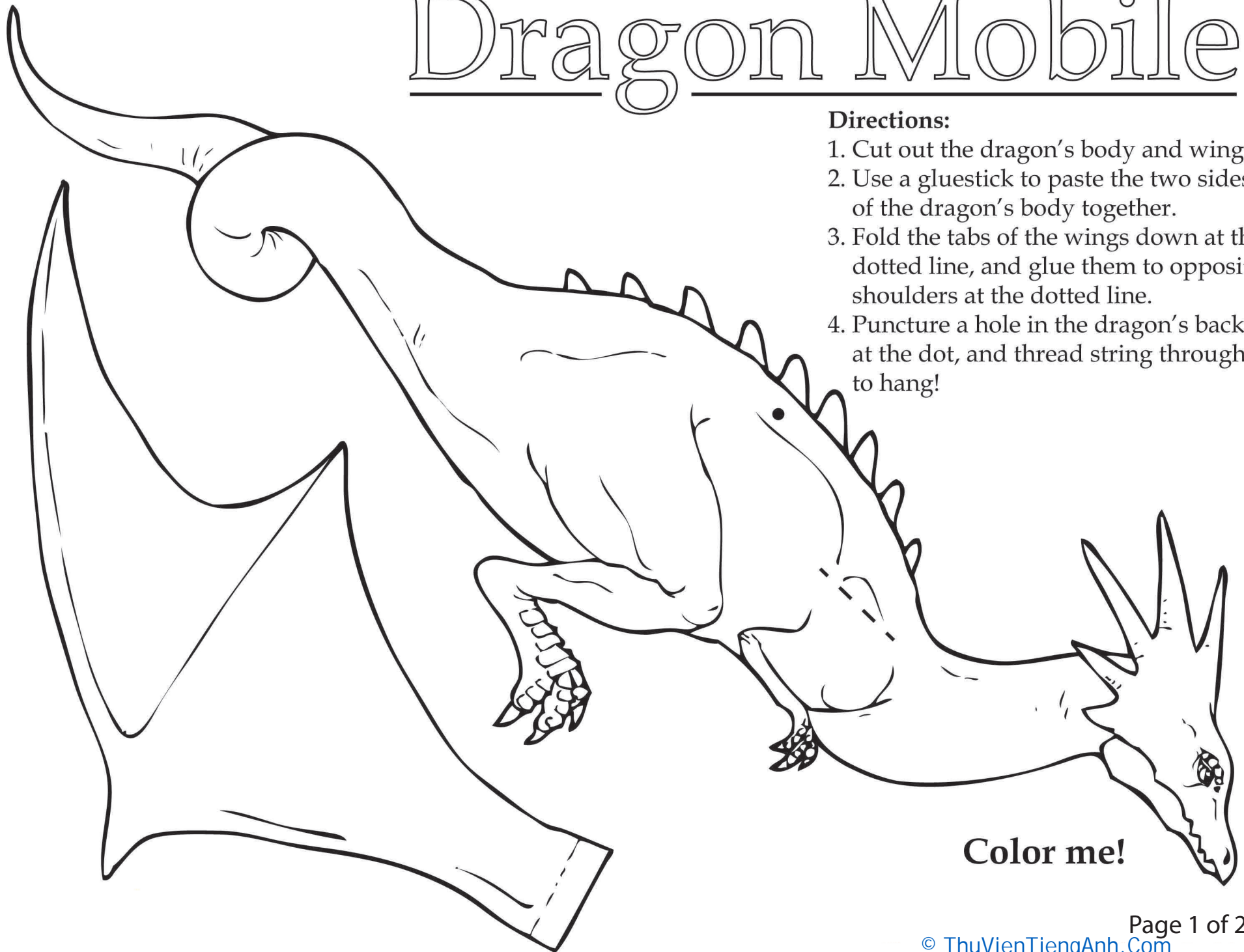
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Dragon Mobile



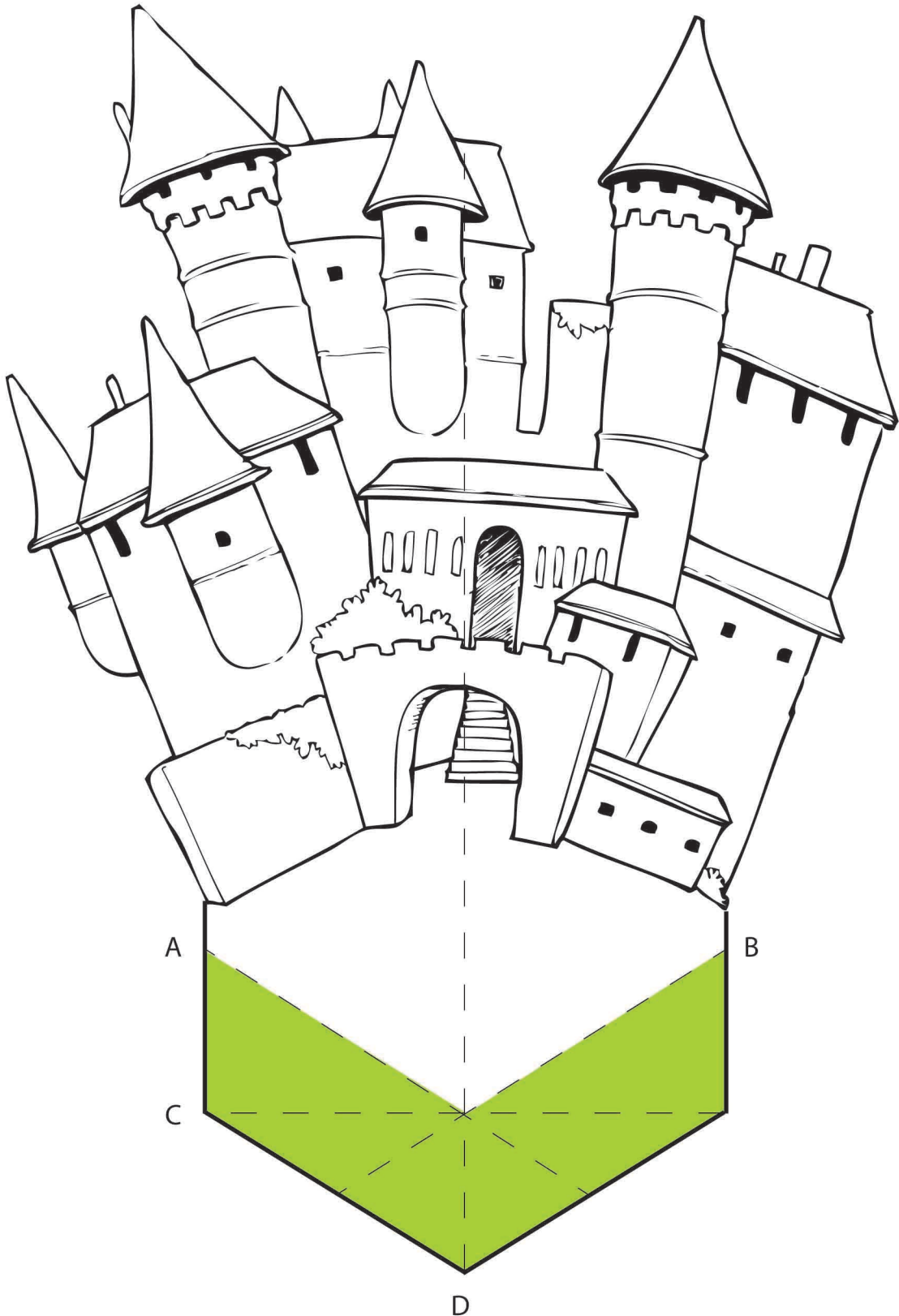
Directions:

2. Use a gluestick to paste the two sides of the dragon's body together.
3. Fold the tabs of the wings down at the dotted line, and glue them to opposite shoulders at the dotted line.
4. Puncture a hole in the dragon's back at the dot, and thread string through to hang!

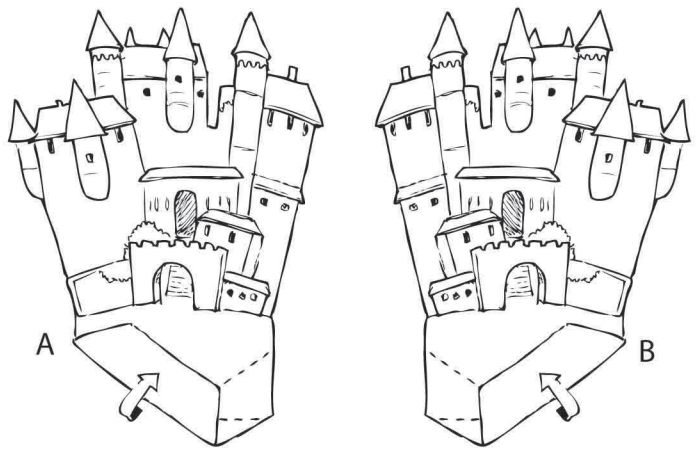


Castle Pop-Up

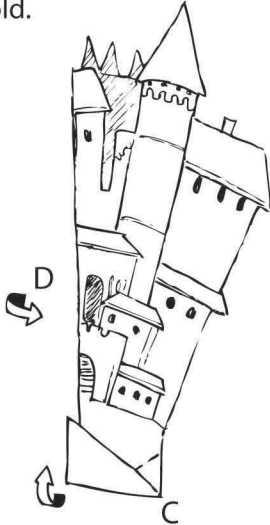


Castle Pop-Up Directions:

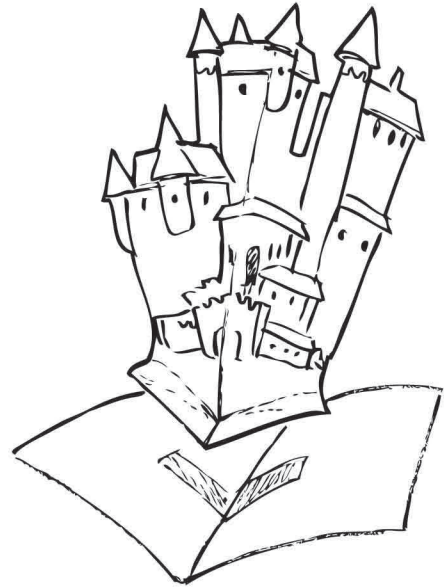
1. Color and cut out the castle.
2. Fold dotted-line A into the castle, make sure to crease the fold well! Then unfold the sheet.
3. Fold dotted-line B into the castle, and then unfold.



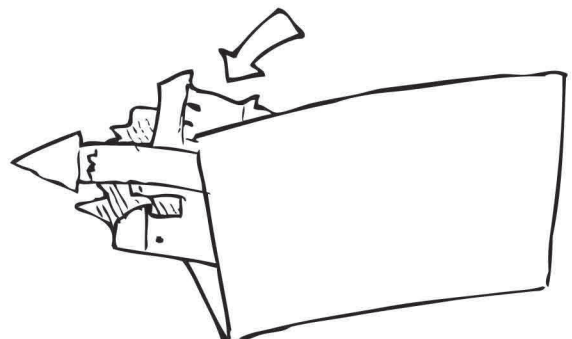
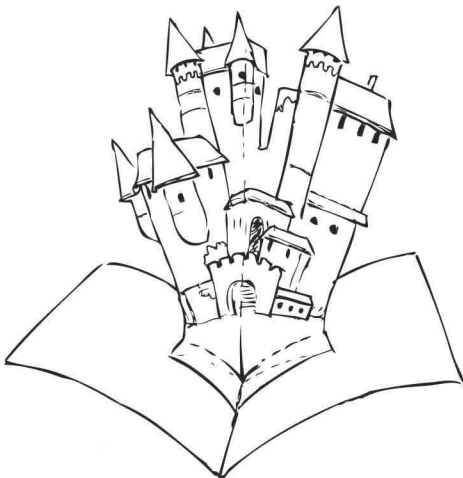
4. Fold dotted-line C into the castle, DO NOT unfold the sheet..
5. Now fold dotted-line D, so that when you look at the paper folded, the castle illustration is face out.



6. Fold a sheet of construction paper in half, hamburger or hot dog style.
7. With a gluestick, glue only the underside of the green section of the castle cutout!
8. With your folded construction paper facing you like a book, fit the castle into the crevice made by the fold, making sure the paper is tucked tightly into the crevice of the construction paper.



9. When the 'book' is open wide, the castle cutout should be creased facing the opposite way of the construction paper. The castle will collapse forward into the book when closed.

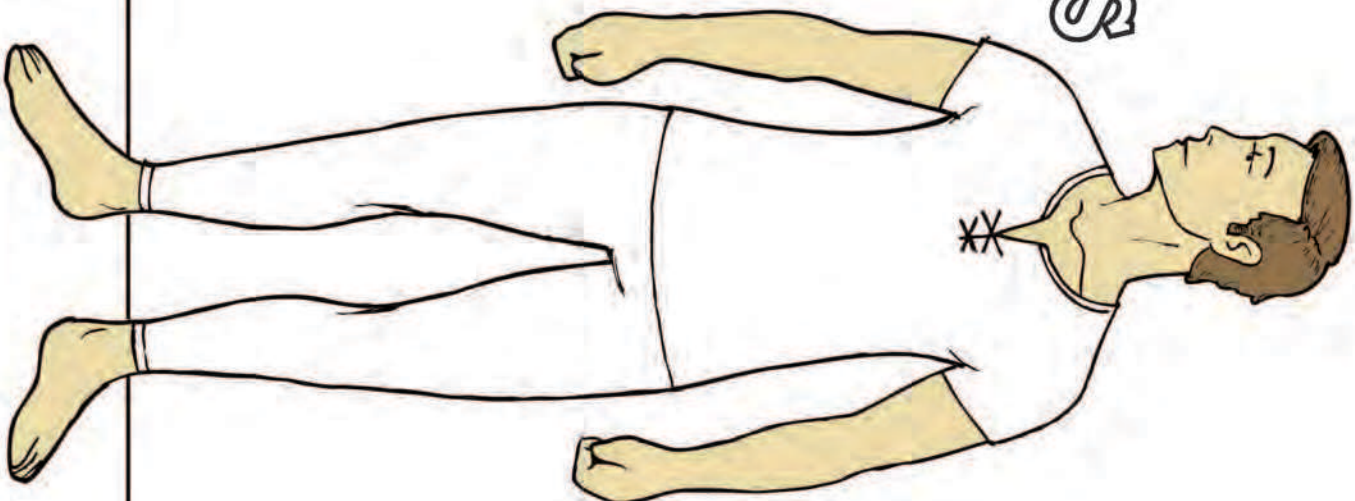
Paper Dolls

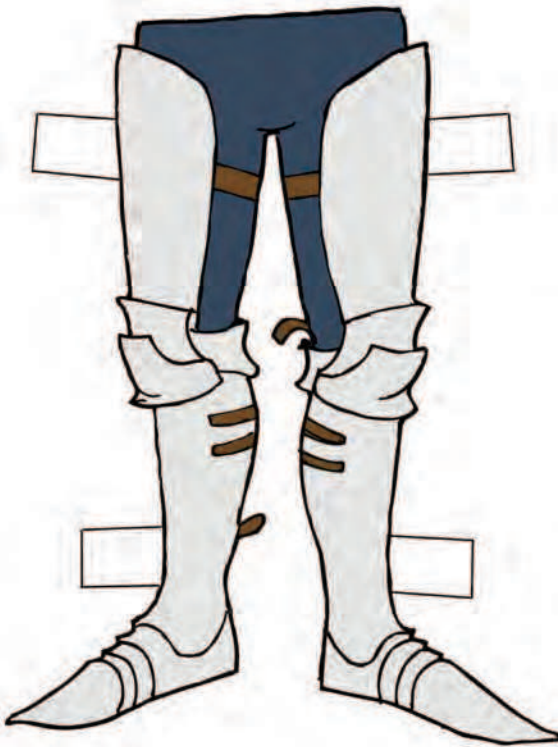
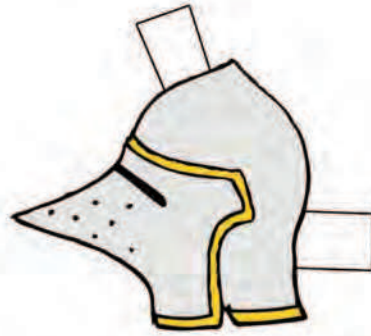
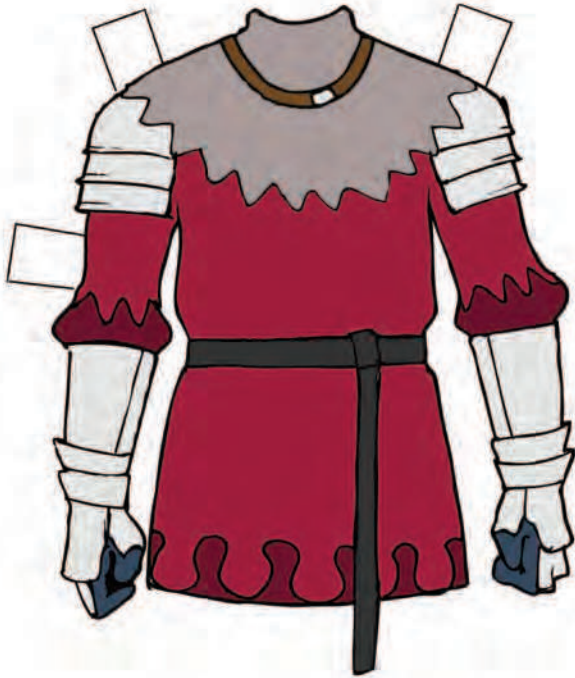
Cut out the armor patterns and attach them to the doll by folding the tabs behind the doll's body.

*Printing on cardstock recommended.



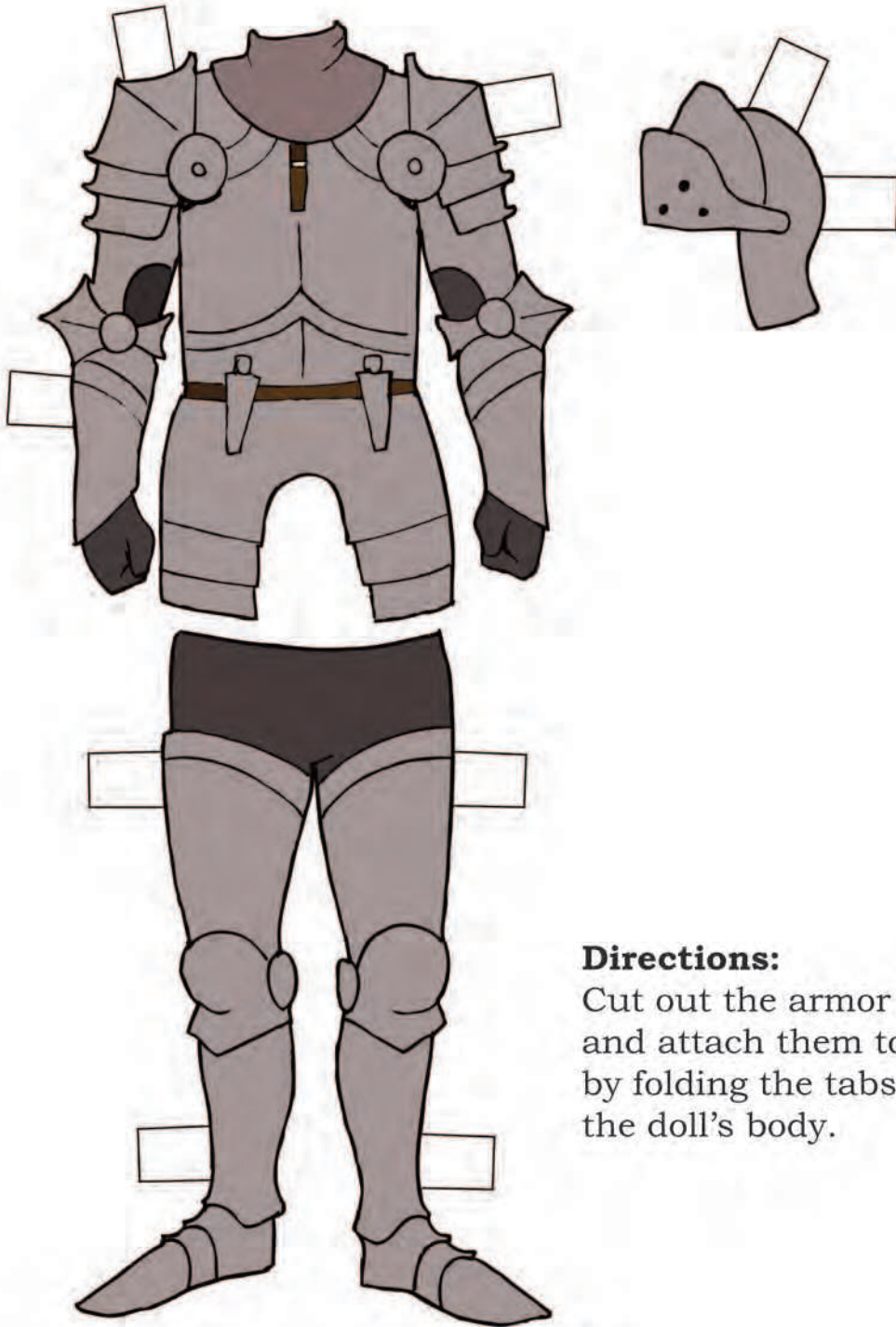

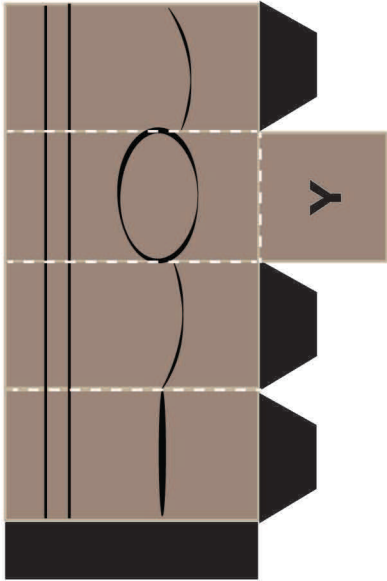
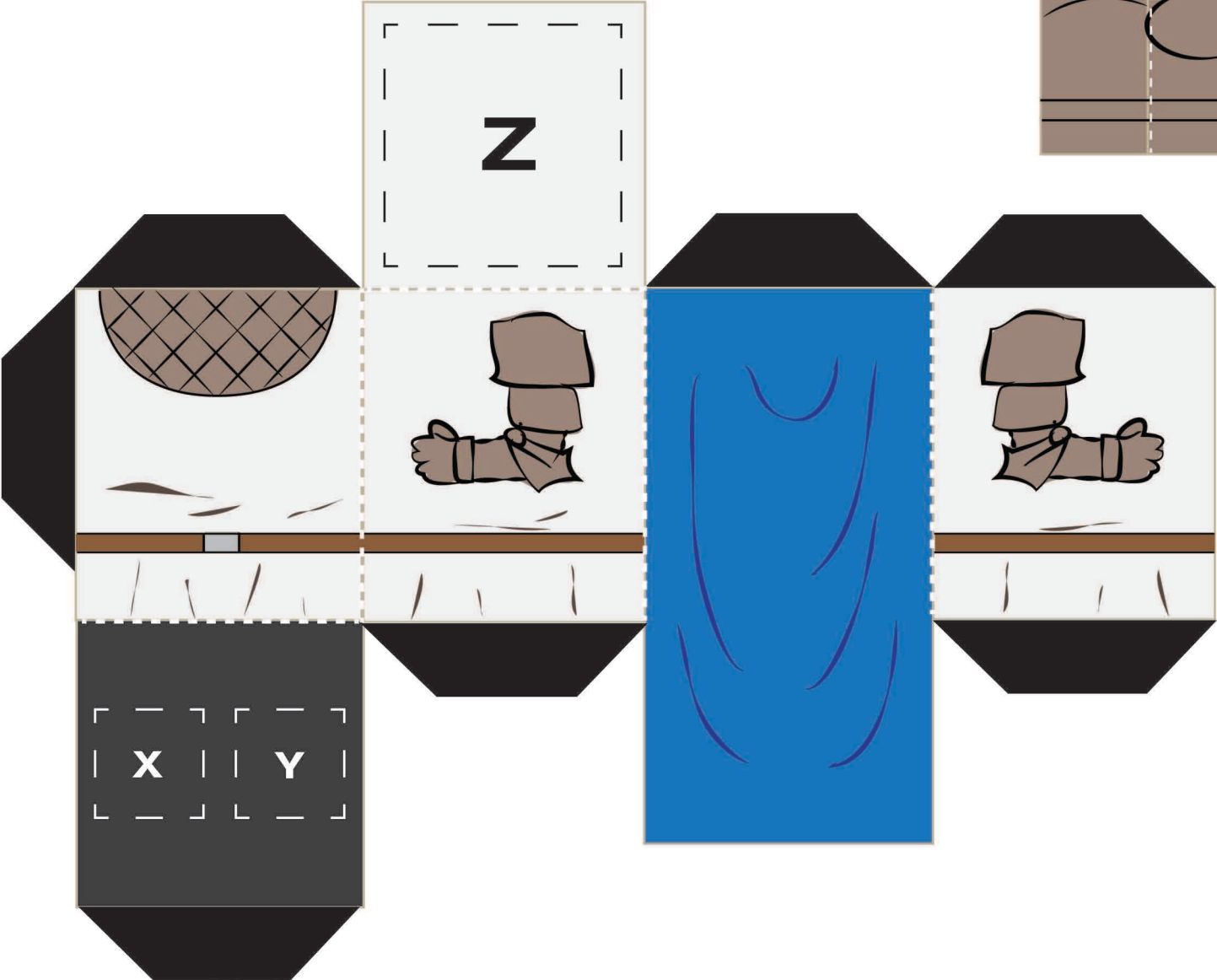
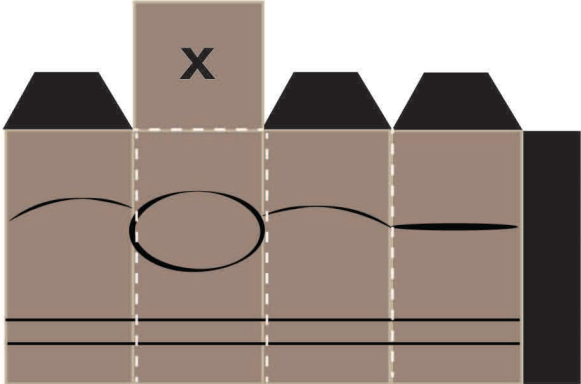
Cube Knight

3. Glue surfaces with letters x, y, z to matching spaces.



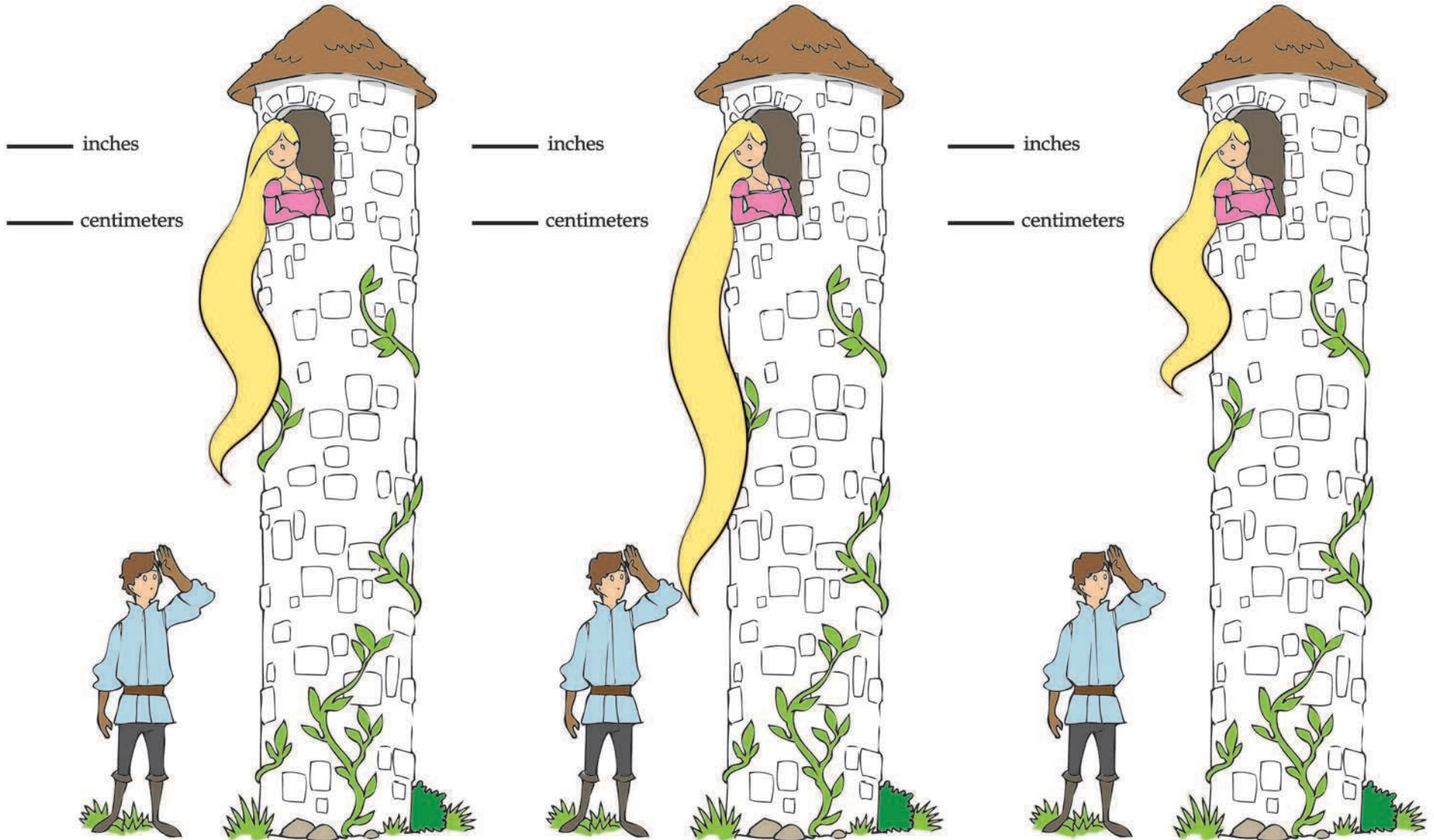

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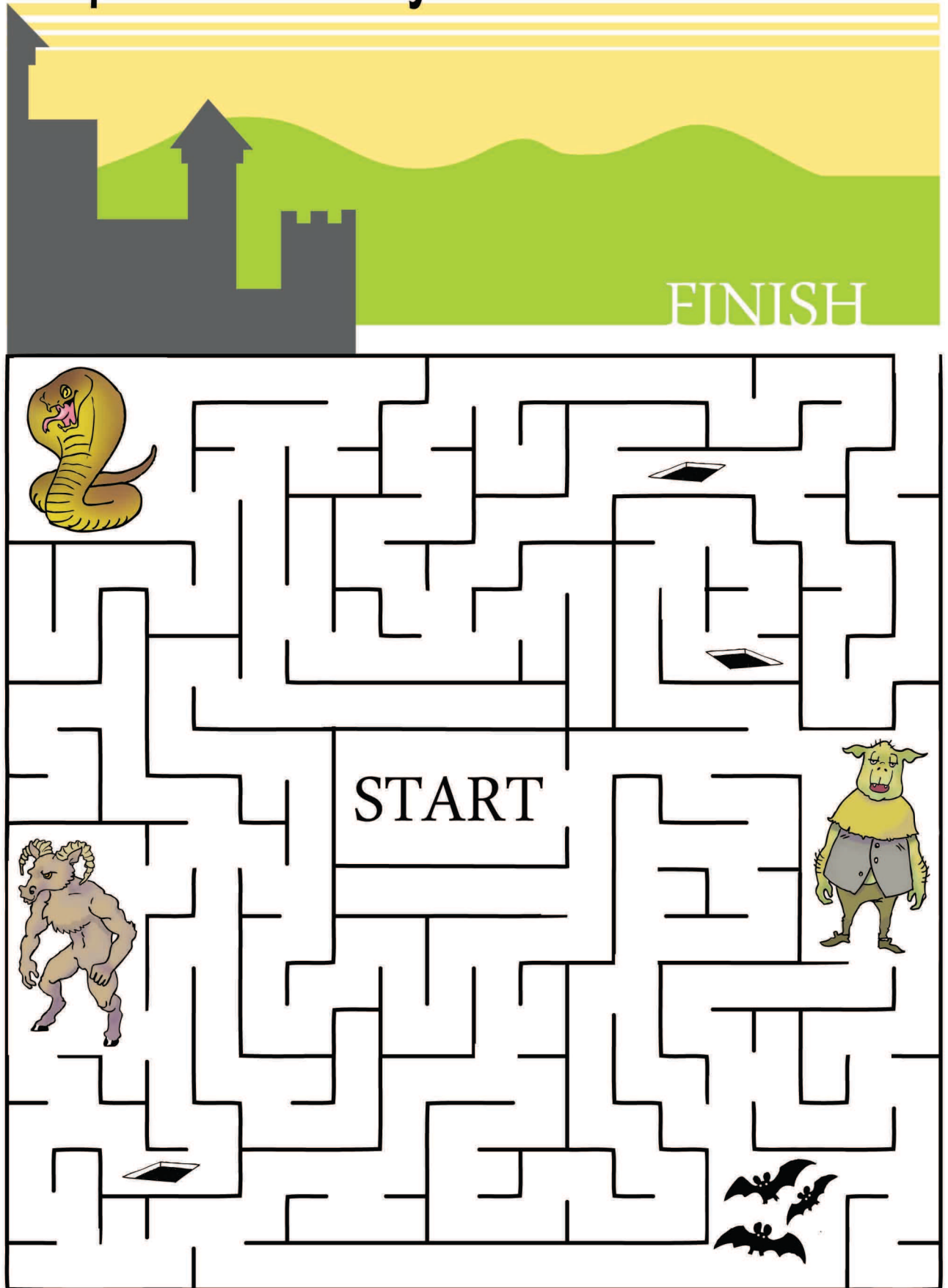


Rapunzel Math!

Rapunzel Card Craft

Rapunzel, Rapunzel, let down your hair! This greeting card is perfect for any little princess, or one of the ladies in her royal court. Watercolor paper, paint, felt, braided yarn and a limitless imagination are all your child needs to bring this fair-haired maiden to life. Rapunzel's tall tower creates the base for the card, and her signature blond hair cascades out the window. This is the perfect craft to share with any budding bookworm.

What You Need:

- 2 sheets Watercolor paper (8.5 inches x 11 inches)
- Watercolor paint
- Brushes
- Paper Towel
- Black Marker
- Glue stick
- Yellow yarn, 6 strands each cut at 24" long
- Brown Felt
- Markers
- Stapler
- Tape



What You Do:

1. Help your child fold both sheets of watercolor vertically, so they are tall and thin. Place one folded card to the side.
2. Fold one half of the folded card in half once again, creating a fold that is 1/4th the size of the paper. Cut the 1/4th segment out with a pair of scissors. Set the rest of the cut sheet of paper aside for another project. The remaining piece will become the top of the tower.
3. Attach the tower extension to the inside top of the folded card using a staple to keep it in place. Tape over the staple to secure the tower at the top of the card.
4. Brush clear water over the entire card.
5. Paint into the water with watercolor paints. Paint the tower with gray paint. Bunch up a paper towel and blot the gray color while it's wet to give it the texture of stone. Make sure to leave a window at the top of the tower for Rapunzel to sit. Paint the land around the tower with flowers, grass and blue skies. Set aside to dry.
6. Gather the yarn and tape one end together. Separate the yarn into three sections.
7. Help little fingers braid the yarn until you reach the end. Tie the end into a knot. Cut the tape off of the other end and tie it in a knot.
8. Cut an oval out of the felt for Rapunzel's face and glue it in the tower.
9. Draw her face onto the felt.
10. Outline the stones on the tower with a black marker.
11. Glue the center of the braid at the top of her head. Glue the braid in place on the card.
12. Write a secret message and give your Rapunzel card to a friend who you love!

Chainmail Art

Tools do more than just fix things! This art project will give your child the opportunity to build up his knight's strength using metal washers, screws, bolts and aluminum foil, creating the most resistant armor anyone has ever seen. This knight made with actual tools is the strongest you'll ever see.

What You Need:


- 18" x 9" foam board
- Tempera paint
- Nuts, bolts, screws, washers in a variety of small sizes
- Aluminum foil
- Scissors
- White glue
- Paintbrushes
- Pencil



What You Do:

1. Have your child paint the foam board red and allow it to dry. Paint a second coat if necessary.
2. Draw the basic outline of the knight onto the dried, painted foam board. Make sure to include the knight's helmet, face, sword, shield and pointed shoes.
3. Now he can paint in the knight's face by mixing a small amount of white and yellow ochre together to create a flesh color. Paint in his eyes and mouth too.
4. Start assembling the nuts, bolts, screws and washers where you want them to go, filling in the pencil line of the knight. Round washers work well for jointed areas, such as shoulders, elbows, knees and ankles.
5. Once they are arranged exactly how you want them, glue them in place, one piece at a time.
6. Cut the aluminum foil into strips and then into squares. Fit it inside the lines of the knight to complete his heroic outfit. Place a thin layer of glue where you want the aluminum foil to go. Gently press the foil down in place.
7. Go back in with a colored paint to add details to the shield and sword.

Your knight is ready to defend! Hang him somewhere you can use protection or the outside of your door to keep intruders away!
