
Let's Draw a Dog!

Start your drawing with very light pencil lines and darken them later.


Step 1: Draw a circle for the head. Put an oval over the circle for the muzzle. Use two curved lines as the neck.




Step 2: Use ovals for the eyes. Add an oval for the nose. Place two ovals above the head to start the ears. Add a curved line for the mouth.



Step 3: Attach the ear ovals to the head with a line. Add an oval to the mouth for the tongue. Put a line down the center of the tongue. Add a large oval around one eye for a cool doggy spot!



Now you have your drawing. Darken the lines you want to keep and gently erase any you don't want. Your dog is ready to be colored.



Spiral Flower

Your second grader will hone their cutting skills making this fun and colorful flower creation. The stem of a plant holds up a flower, along with providing nutrients, helping the flower to grow. Your child can learn more about plants while making this fun art project!

What You Need:

- Green construction paper
- Construction paper for the flower
- Glue
- Ruler
- Pencil
- Scissors

What You Do:

- 1. Take a look at a flower with your child, either by heading outdoors or looking at a flower in a book or on the internet.
- 2. See if your child can recognize the parts of the flower, such as the stem, leaves and petals! They can look at several types of flowers and notice how some have similar petals and others are different.
- 3. Now it's time to make their own interesting flower! Start by turning a 9" by 12" sheet of green construction paper into a 9" by 9" square with the help of a ruler and pencil.
- 4. Invite your child to trim and curve the four corners of their square, creating a circle. Then have your child draw a spiraling line starting at the outside edge of the green paper and ending in the center of their square.
- 5. Now they can use their scissors to carefully follow and cut along their spiraling line, honing their concentration and cutting skills!
- 6. Now they've got a spiraling stem for their flower! Invite them to cut out a circle from one color of construction paper and petals from another. They can also cut a couple of green leaves to attach to their stem!
- 7. Offer your child the glue and encourage them to glue together their flower and then attach it to the end (the outside part) of their spiral along with the leaves they cut out!
- 8. Now they can hang their spiraling flower from the center of the spiral stem and watch as it moves and sways in the air!


