- 1. Part A: What is the primary metaphor that Dickinson uses in the poem?
  - a. hope is a crumb
- **b.** hope is a bird
- c. hope is a feather
- d. hope is a singer

Part B: Cite at least two words in the first stanza that support your answer in Part A.

The words "feathers," "perches," and "sings" all show that hope is being compared to a bird.

2. Reread the following lines from stanza 1 and consider the meaning of the bold word.

> "Hope" is the thing with feathers – That **perches** in the soul –

What can you infer about hope based on the action in these two lines?

4. Part A: In a complete sentence, write the central idea or theme of the poem.

Hope provides strength, inspiration, and perseverance to a person facing obstacles.

Part B: Explain how stanzas 2 and 3 support the central idea or theme you described in Part A. Stanza 2: <u>It shows that hope is strong, and it</u> would take significant strife and chaos to disturb it. The metaphor compares hope's endurance to a bird's endurance in the middle of a storm. Stanza 3: Hope remains, helping a person to persevere when they're in their darkest and most difficult moments.

- 5. Explain what lines 11 and 12 reveal about the subject of hope.
  - Lines 11 and 12 show that "hope" is selfless as it does not ask for anything in return for its presence or inspiration. Even in extreme circumstances, hope remains constant.
- 6. Read the poem out loud. How does the rhythm of the poem match its meaning and tone?

The song-like rhythm of the poem matches the positive feeling of hope in the poem.
