Comma Rules for Kids

- Comma Rules: Commas go in a list of items of two or more.
 - Commas go after transition words.



- Commas go between the day and year. They also go after the year if there are more words after the year.
- Commas go between the city and state. They also go after the state if there are words after the state.
- Commas go before a conjunction (and, or, but).
