Comma Splicing

Answer Key

Comma splicing is the use of a comma to separate two independent clauses. A clause is a part of a sentence that contains a subject and a predicate. Use *punctuation* and/or *conjunctions* to fix the comma splices below. There may be more than one correct answer for each example.

Examples of punctuation	Examples of conjunction
•	because

!	so

Example of comma splicing: Mary ran fast, she was late for school. **Example of a correction:** Mary ran fast <u>because</u> she was late for school.

- Comma splice: I was not hungry, I ate lunch anyway.

 Correction: I was not hungry, but I ate lunch anyway.
- 2. Comma splice: She went to the grocery store, she bought a quart of milk.

 Correction: She went to the grocery store, and she bought a quart of milk.
- Comma splice: Toby was the fastest runner on the track team, he won many awards.

 Correction: Toby was the fastest runner on the track team, so he won many awards.
