COMMAS TO SEPARATE INTRODUCTORY ELEMENTS

Introductory elements are words, phrases, or clauses that appear at the beginning of a sentence. They introduce the topic and transition the reader to the main clause of the sentence. A comma is needed to separate the introductory element from the rest of the sentence. Look at the examples below.



Yes, my family is going on a summer trip.
In this sentence, "Yes" is an introductory element.

This year, we're camping for a week in Maine. In this sentence, "This year" is an introductory phrase.
