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## Fall Figurative Language Task Cards



Figurative language uses words or expressions to convey a meaning that is different from the literal interpretation. Writers use figurative language to make comparisons, and to help the reader create a more vivid picture of the text. Some examples of figurative language include hyperbole, simile, metaphor, onomatopoeia, and personification. Cut up these task cards and use them to teach or review figurative language.

Figurative Language	Definition	Examples
Hyperbole	an exaggeration, usually with humor	I'm so hungry, I could eat a horse!  She's running faster than the wind.
Simile	comparing one thing to another, usually using the words <i>like</i> or <i>as</i>	Last night, I slept like a log.  Maria's face was as red as a tomato.
Metaphor	comparing two unrelated things by stating that one thing is another thing	You are my sunshine.  Jack is a night owl.
Onomatopoeia	words that imitate the sound they make	Whoosh! The bird dashed out of the house.  "Quack, quack!", said the ducks as they crossed the street.
Personification	giving a non-human thing human qualities	The plants were begging to be watered.  My car was not pleased with me.
Idiom	a saying that has a meaning that's different than the literal meaning	The exam was a piece of cake!  It was raining cats and dogs yesterday.
