Form Perfect Verb Tenses

The **perfect tense** tells about completed actions, such as what *had*, *has*, or *will have* happened.

The past perfect tense tells about something that had happened before something else. It uses the helping verb had.

Example: By the time we went home for the day, we had collected 79 cans of food for the food pantry.

The present perfect tense tells about something that has happened or has started already. It uses the helping verb has or have.

Example: I <u>have collected</u> rare coins for five years.

The future perfect tense tells about something that will have happened in the future before something else. It uses the helping verb will have.

Example: I <u>will have</u> <u>collected</u> a jar of erasers before the school year is over.
