Homographic Puns

A **pun** is a humorous play on words where the word's meaning, or the way the word sounds, is used to create a joke. A **homographic pun** uses a word that has two different meanings to make a joke.

Example: The experienced carpenter really nailed it, but the new guy **screwed** everything up.

- a. Word used for the pun: screwed
- b. First meaning of word: screw used with screwdrivers
- c. Second meaning of word: messed up
- d. What makes it a pun? Using "carpenter," "nailed it," and "screwed everything up" helps show that the new guy messed up the construction.

1. A cross-eyed teacher couldn't control his pupils.

A. Word used for the pun: pupils

B. First meaning: **students**

C. Second meaning: part of an eye

D. What makes it a pun? The sentence is about unruly students, but it relates both of the meanings of a pupil to the teacher's eyes.

2. I used to be afraid of hurdles, but I got over it.

A. Word used for the pun: hurdles

B. First meaning: what you jump over during a track race

C. Second meaning: an obstacle in life

D. What makes it a pun? Both meanings of "hurdle" are used in this sentence. The person got over the fear, and people go over hurdles when they run the race.

3. My friend made a joke about a TV controller. It wasn't remotely funny.

A. Word used for the pun: remotely

B. First meaning: not even a little bit

C. Second meaning: a remote used to change the channels on the tv

D. What makes it a pun? The sentence connects the remote for the tv with the word "remotely" because the joke was not even a little bit funny.
