## **Identify Base Words, Prefixes, and Suffixes**

A base word can stand alone and has meaning by itself. A prefix is a word part added to the beginning of a base word. A suffix is a word part added to the end of a base word. Prefixes and suffixes change the meaning of the word. Look at the example below.

## preheated

The base word is heat.

The prefix is pre-. It means before.

The suffix is -ed. It makes the verb past tense.
