Describe the effect of the great earthquake of 1755 on the Portuguese azulejo tradition. Cite specific evidence from the text to support your response.

The earthquake destroyed Lisbon. The city needed to be rebuilt, and since tiles were cheaper than stone, weather-resistant, and relatively low maintenance, azulejos were used to help rebuild. This caused a return to the earlier, simpler geometric designs of azulejos.
