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# STUDY **THE LIGHTNING THIEF:** Analyzing Characters' Dialogue

In The Lightning Thief, Percy Jackson's matter-of-fact statements, as well as his wit, bring humor to the novel. Not only does Percy's sense of humor show throughout the novel, but we see his friends, and even some of his enemies, use similar ways to communicate.

Authors use literary techniques such as verbal irony and sarcasm to develop funny and dramatic situations. These techniques help move the story forward and help readers understand the characters' personalities and motivations.

Verbal irony is when a character says something that's different from what they really mean or feel.



Sarcasm is also when a character says something that's different from what they really mean or feel, but it's meant to mock or ridicule. Sarcasm relies on the speaker's tone of voice, which is often negative. Sarcasm can be used to criticize someone or something, show disapproval, or poke fun at something.
