

Past Tense Quicksand Challenge

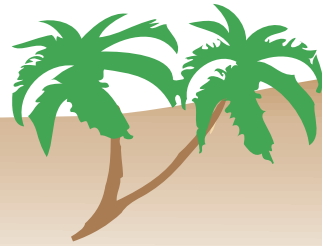
To leave this mysterious island, you must walk across the beach and find the boat, but this beach has areas of quicksand! You must follow the path of past tense verbs to avoid the quicksand.

Draw a path from one past tense verb to the next. You can go vertically, horizontally, or diagonally.

Be careful! Many past tense verbs are spelled just like present tense with “ed” on the end, but some have special spellings. The past tense of “walk” is “walked”, but the past tense of “catch” is **NOT** “catched”. It’s “caught”.

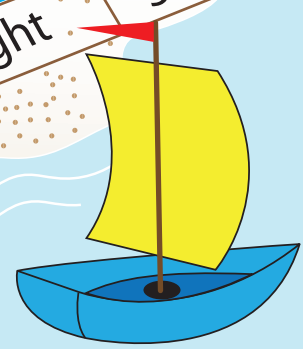


Watch Out:
