PRONOUNS:

Let's Make an Agreement!

A **pronoun** is a word that takes the place of a noun or noun phrase. The noun or noun phrase that the pronoun refers to is called the **antecedent**. A pronoun must agree with its antecedent.



For example:

Correct: The <u>satellite</u> orbited <u>its</u> moon. • Incorrect: The <u>satellite</u> orbited their moon.

In this example, "satellite" is singular, so it requires a singular pronoun.

When working with a noun phrase, the pronoun should agree with the subject.

For example:

Correct: The packet of fuel cells reached its destination.

Incorrect: The packet of fuel cells reached their destination.



In this example, "packet" is singular, so it requires a singular pronoun. While "fuel cells" is plural, it modifies the noun.
