The theme of a story conveys a message or lesson about life that can apply to any person, not just the story's characters. The theme is typically not stated outright, but rather revealed by the story's characters and their actions.
1.	Directions: After reading the story, answer the questions to find the theme. What problem did the crab face?

2.	How did the crab solve his problem?
