## USE ELLIPSES IN NARRATIVE DIALOGUE

An ellipsis ( . . . ) is a series of three dots that can be used to indicate a pause, hesitation, or break in a speaker's thoughts. Ellipses represent a more dramatic pause than a comma but a less confident pause than a dash. Used sparingly, ellipses can be great tools in narrative or informal writing to help readers "hear" written dialogue more clearly.

Directions: For each scenario, write a line of dialogue incorporating ellipses to show the desired pause.

## Ex. Scenario: a pause to announce competition results Sample answers

"And the grand prize goes to . . . Jennifer!"

1 Scenario: a pause to consider the best way to accomplish a task
"Let's first . . . set out all of the pieces."
2 Scenario: a break to recall the name of something
"That bakery used to be called . . . Snowflakes, I think."

3 Scenario: a hesitation before revealing something embarrassing
"I . . . might have put salt instead of sugar in these cookies."
4 Scenario: a pause to share good news
"I heard back from the art academy, and . . . I got in!"
5 Scenario: a hesitation before telling someone a secret
"You can't tell anyone, but . . . I'm planning a surprise party for Shawna."
6 Scenario: a break to show that the speaker cannot believe what they just saw
"Did I just . . . see my favorite singer outside the grocery store?"
7 Scenario: a pause to figure out the way to a destination
"You'll need to turn . . . just after those rose bushes."
8 Scenario: a hesitation to show that the speaker is unsure of how to describe an event
"It was so strange! It was sort of like . . . a tidal wave of people rushing at me."
9 Scenario: a break to show that the speaker doesn't know what to say next and trails off "It might be okay, but I don't know ..."

10 Scenario: a pause because the speaker is feeling anxious about trying something new "Sol... put the sauce on first before I try it?"
