

Use Parallel Structure: Review

Parallel structure improves the flow and readability of your sentences! It's important to use the same grammatical form when listing two or more linked ideas in a sentence so that readers can easily follow and understand your writing. Mixing grammatical forms can break up patterns and make sentence sound clunky. For example:

Not Parallel

Luke's dentist recommended brushing twice a day, dental floss, and to use a good mouthwash.

Parallel

Luke's dentist recommended **brushing** twice a day, **flossing**, and **using** a good mouthwash.

or

Luke's dentist recommended that he **brush** twice a day, **floss**, and **use** a good mouthwash.
