## **Use Verb Mood for Effect**

The mood of a verb communicates the intention of the speaker or writer. When choosing your verb mood, think about the message you want to convey.

Verb Mood	Effect	Example
indicative	expresses a fact or opinion	Sal <b>gives</b> the horse a carrot.
interrogative	asks a question	<b><u>Did</u></b> Sal <b>give</b> the horse a carrot?
imperative	expresses a direct command	Sal, <b>give</b> the horse a carrot.
conditional	expresses the potential effect of a condition being met	If Sal gave the horse carrots, she <b>would like</b> him more.
subjunctive	expresses counterfactuals, or hypothetical situations that are not true or not possible	If the horse <b>were</b> friendlier, Sal would give her more carrots.
	expresses <i>indirect</i> demands, requests, and suggestions	The stable hand suggested that Sal <b>give</b> the horse apples instead of carrots.

## For each problem, rewrite the scenario to achieve a different effect. Sample answers



1. Express a direct command: Remain seated until the plane arrives at the gate. Express an indirect demand or request: The flight attendant requests that passengers remain seated until the plane arrives at the gate.



2. Ask a question: Has the tennis player recovered from her injury yet? Express a potential effect of a condition being met: If the tennis player rested and iced her injury for two weeks, she would be allowed to return to practice.



**3. Express a direct command:** Catch the ice cream truck before it leaves the neighborhood! Express a counterfactual: If I were faster, I would have caught the ice cream truck before it left the neighborhood.



**4. Express an indirect demand or request:** Mrs. Holland requested that I pet-sit her dogs for her when she goes out of town this weekend.

Express a potential effect of a condition being met: If Mrs. Holland went out of town, I would pet-sit her dogs for her.

5. Express a counterfactual: If he were more attentive in the morning, Dario might not have forgotten his lunch at home.

Express a fact or opinion: Dario forgot his lunch at home because he wasn't paying attention this morning.



6. Express a potential effect of a condition being met: If the arcade had a laser tag arena, we would spend most of our time playing laser tag.

Ask a question: Does the arcade have a laser tag arena?



Express a counterfactual: If I were you, I would turn my phone off completely before the movie begins. 7. Express a direct command: Make sure your phone is on silent before the movie begins.



8. Express an indirect demand or request: Jayden requested that we stop by and say hello if we see him at the trampoline park.

Express a potential effect of a condition being met: If we saw Jayden at the trampoline park, we would stop by and say hello.





Express a direct command: Study your vocabulary cards and the study guide before the life science test on Friday.

Express a counterfactual: If I were you, I would study the vocabulary cards and study guide before the life science test on Friday.

10. Express a counterfactual: If I were a school bus driver, I would play music to brighten the students' day on the way to and from school.

Express an indirect demand or request: The students request that the school bus driver play music for them on the way to and from school.



11. Ask a question: Did you hear a peculiar noise coming from the basement last night? Express a counterfactual: If I heard a peculiar noise coming from the basement at night, I would call someone to help me investigate.

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
