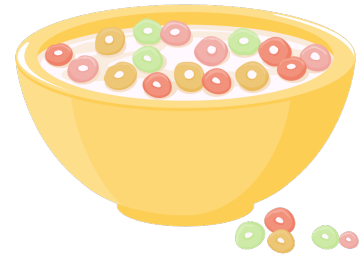


Using Coordinating Conjunctions: Food



Coordinating conjunctions are connecting words that combine two independent clauses to make a compound sentence. To help you remember the coordinating conjunctions, use FAN BOYS.

For And Nor But Or Yet So
