

## Using the Correct Verb Mood: Indicative and Subjunctive

The mood of a verb shows the writer's or speaker's purpose or attitude. Different verb moods follow different rules for subject-verb agreement.



Verbs in **indicative mood** express statements of fact or opinion. Most sentences and clauses in English use the indicative mood. Verbs in the indicative mood follow **normal subject-verb agreement rules**.

*Netta practices on the trampoline every day to perfect her back handspring.*

*Tate and Jeanie are first in line to get concert tickets.*

Verbs in **subjunctive mood** may express indirect demands, requests, and suggestions, used in clauses after phrases such as "request that." In these situations, the **base form of the verb** is used.

*The coach recommends that Netta practice every day to perfect her back handspring.*

*I suggest that Tate and Jeanie be first in line if they want the best tickets to the concert.*

Verbs in the subjunctive mood may also express **counterfactuals**, or situations that are not true or not possible under the current circumstances. In these situations, the plural verb "**were**" is used even for singular subjects.

*If Netta were more confident, she would practice her back handspring on the grass.*

*If I were them, I would arrive at the ticket box office two hours in advance.*
