Comparative and Superlative Adjective Game

Comparative adjectives are used when comparing two things.

Superlative adjectives are used when comparing three or more things.

Score as many points as you can! Read the coach's advice and then write the comparative and superlative forms of the adjectives. There are three rounds and a bonus round. Some point values increase and change as the words get trickier. Do the best you can and you'll get the least wrong.

Round One: One Syllable Adjectives

Adjective	Comparative	Superlative
big	1 point bigger	1 point biggest
tall	1 point taller	1 point tallest
sad	1 point sadder	1 point saddest
hot	1 point hotter	1 point hottest
red	1 point redder	1 point reddest
wide	1 point wider	1 point widest

Coach says: +er or +est, if it ends in 'y' change the 'y' to 'i' first. If it ends in a vowel then a consonant, double the consonant.

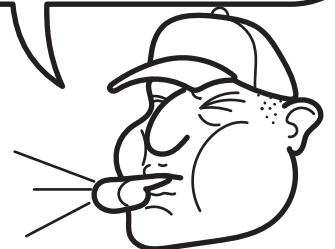

Round Two: Two Syllable Adjectives

Adjective	Comparative	Superlative
peaceful	2 points more peaceful	2 points most peaceful
busy	3 points busier	3 points busiest
thoughtful	2 points more thoughtful	2 points most thoughtful
furry	3 points furrier	3 points furriest
tangled	2 points more tangled	2 points most tangled
brilliant	2 points more brilliant	2 points most brilliant

Coach says: With most two syllable words simply add 'more' or 'most' before the word. Common exception: If it ends in 'y', use the same rule as one syllable words.

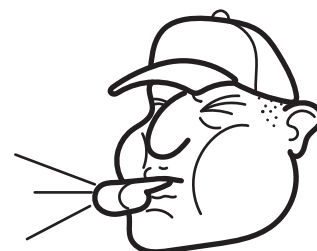

fashionable	3 points	more fashionable	3 points	most fashionable
satisfactory	3 points	more satisfactory	3 points	most satisfactory
talkative	3 points	more talkative	3 points	most talkative

Coach says: Add 'more' or 'most' before the word.
