Writing a Bibliography

When writing research papers, you may be asked to follow a particular style guide for your citations. One of the most popular style guides is the *Modern Language Association (MLA) Handbook*.

The eighth edition of the *MLA Handbook* specifies **nine main elements** for any citation. These nine elements should always appear in this order, and with this punctuation:

Author. Title of the source. Title of the container, Other contributors, Version, Number, Publisher, Publication date, Location. Date of access.

If a citation element does not apply to the type of work being cited, or if the information is missing, that element is simply left out. Be sure to indent anything after the first line. Here are some examples of how these citations can look:

Format (book)	Author. <i>Title of the source</i> . Publisher, Publication date.
Example	Stevenson, Robert Louis. Treasure Island. Signet Classic, 1998.

Format (online article)	Authors. "Title of the source." <i>Title of the container</i> , Publisher, Publication date, Location. Date of access.
Example	Rubio, Paul, and Alex Erdekian. "The Best East Coast Road Trips to Take This Year." <i>Condé Nast Traveler</i> , Condé Nast, 28 July 2020, www.cntraveler.com/gallery/the-best-east-coast-road-trips. Accessed 9 September 2020.
