Adverbs are words that modify or describe verbs or action words. They tell how, when, or where something happened. Adverbial phrases are two or more words that function as an adverb.

He worked at the hospital daily.

Before the year ended, he had saved over a hundred lives.

The underlined word is an **adverb** that shows when or how often.

The underlined words make an **adverbial phrase** that shows when.
