## Asking Deeper Questions in Fiction Texts



Red light questions are those that we can answer using words and sentences in the text. After we answer a red light question, we STOP thinking. They are usually simple questions.

Green light questions can be answered using clues from the text and our own knowledge. They are also known as inferential questions. To answer a green light question, we must START thinking (green means go or start).

## EXAMPLE:

"Angela was exhausted from her hiking trip, but when she arrived home, she realized she had no food in the fridge. She had no choice but to go out, even though she was tired."
