


# Changing Passive Voice to Active Voice #2

In grammar, **voice** communicates whether the subject of a clause performs or receives the verb's action.

<p>If a sentence is written in <b>active voice</b>, the subject <i>performs</i> the action of the verb.</p>	<p>The baker <b>decorated</b> the cupcakes.  <u>Subject</u> + <b>verb performed by the subject</b> + optional object</p>	
<p>If a sentence is written in <b>passive voice</b>, the subject <i>receives</i> the verb's action.</p>	<p>The cupcakes <b>were decorated</b> by the baker.  <u>Subject</u> + form of <i>to be</i> + <b>past participle of verb</b> + prepositional phrase</p>	
<p>When a sentence is in passive voice, the person or thing performing the action might be <i>implied</i> rather than directly mentioned.</p>	<p>The cupcakes <b>were decorated</b>.  <u>Subject</u> + form of <i>to be</i> + <b>past participle of verb</b>  <b>Note:</b> The <i>implied</i> performer, the baker, is not included in this sentence.</p>	

Though exceptions exist, it is best to use active voice in formal writing.
