Cinquain Poem

A cinquain is a five-line poem that was invented in the 1900s by American poet Adelaide Crapsey. Traditional cinquains use a five-line format that is based on a syllable count. The modern cinquain also uses a five-line format, but instead of counting syllables the modern cinquain uses a word count format. Each line must contain a certain number of words.

The Correct Layout of a Modern Cinquain Poem:

line 1: one word (noun) a title or subject

line 2: two words (adjectives) describing the title

line 3: three words (verbs that end in -ing) describing an action related to the title

line 4: four words written as a phrase that describe line 1

line 5: one word that can be a synonym for the title
