

Cite and Explain Your Evidence #2 Literary Response



Essayists state an opinion that they can support with strong evidence. They also explain why their evidence matters. Let's take a look at an example of this.

Example

Claim: In Gary Soto's short story "The Marble Champ," Lupe learns that with determination and hard work, you can overcome difficulties and achieve your goals.

Evidence: On page 38, Soto shows how tired Lupe was feeling when he said Lupe's muscles "burned from exhaustion."

Explanation of Evidence: This part of the book is important because it shows how tired Lupe felt. The author wants the reader to understand that even when Lupe felt exhausted, she did not give up. This helped Lupe achieve her goal.
