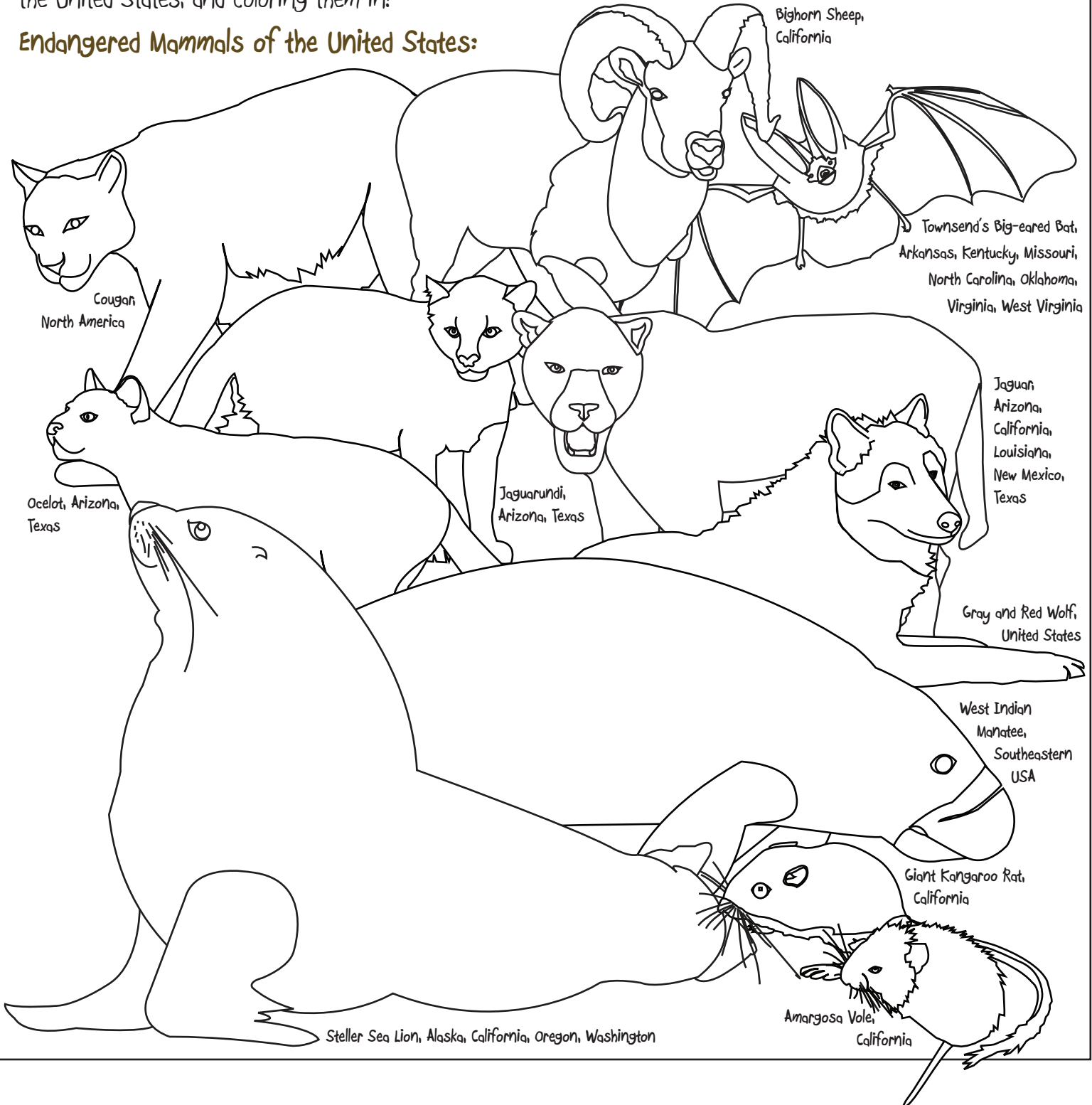


Endangered Species

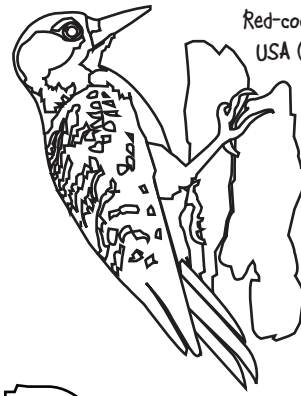

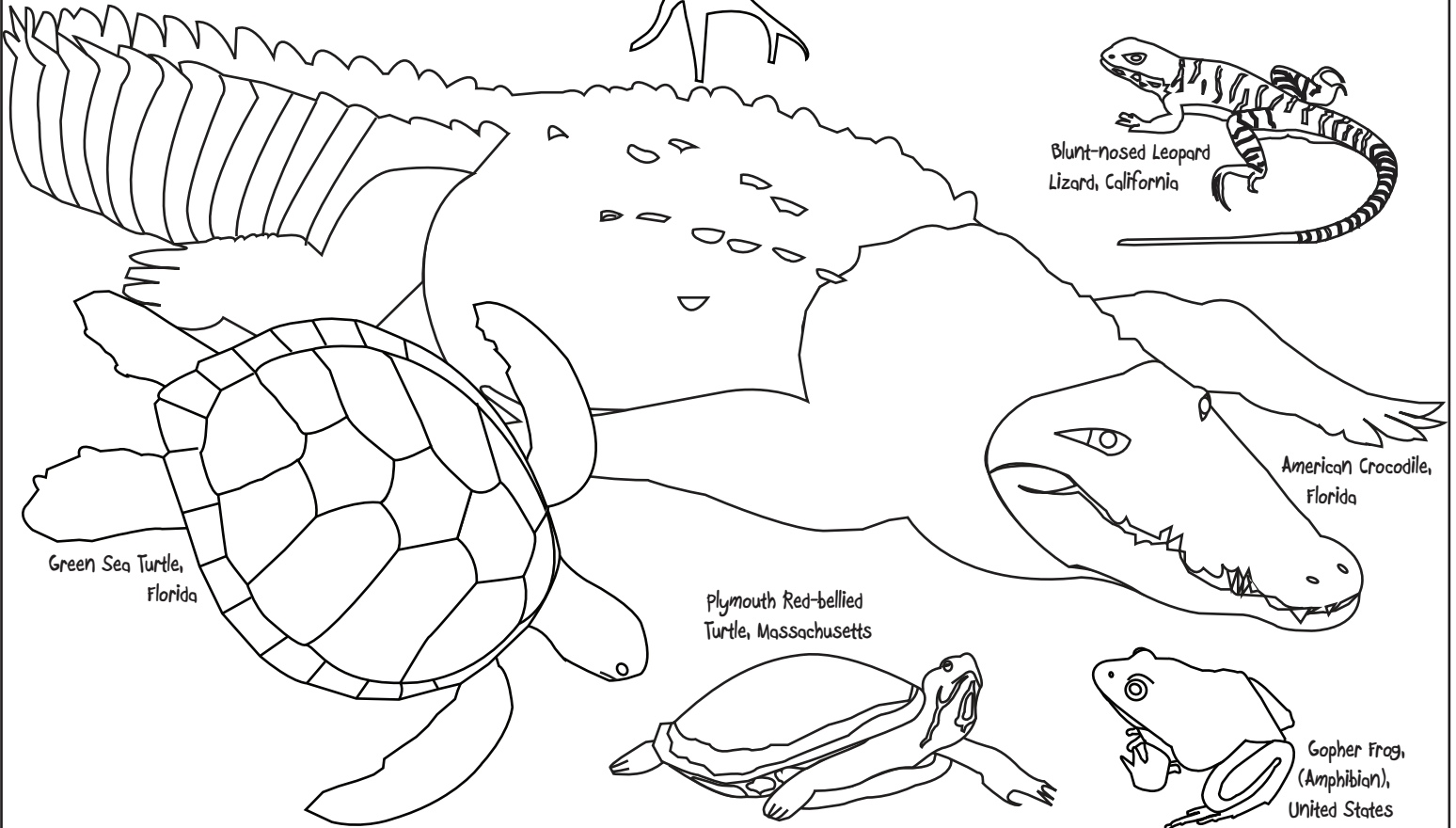


Red-cockaded Woodpecker

southeastern)

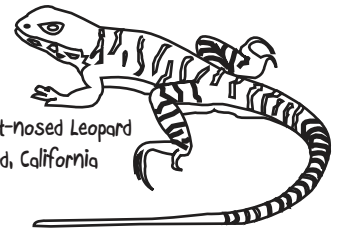


Ivory-billed Woodpecker

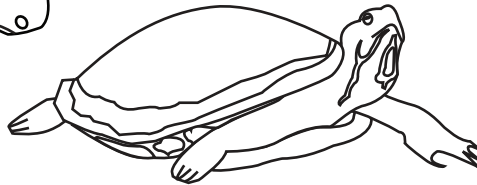
