

Combine Sentences Using Relative Clauses #1

A **relative clause** is a dependent clause that functions as an adjective. It provides more information about the noun or pronoun it modifies. A relative clause is often signaled by one of these relative pronouns: *who*, *whom*, *whose*, *which*, or *that*.

Ms. McCoy, **who** teaches creative writing, assigned a book report.

*The relative clause provides information about the noun **Ms. McCoy**.*

You can use a relative clause to combine sentences. Here's an example:

The novel is one of my favorites. We're reading it in Ms. McCoy's class.

The novel **that** we're reading in Ms. McCoy's class is one of my favorites.

*The relative clause provides information about the noun **novel**.*
