## **Decoding: Using Beginning and End Sounds**

Some words look and sound alike. If we read too fast, we might say the wrong word. It is important for readers to pay attention to the beginning and end sounds of words so they can read the correct word!

The **beginning** sound of the word is the first part. (blend

The **end** sound of the word is the last part. **blend**)

Example: The gecko tries to <u>blend</u> in with its surroundings. (blend, bend)
