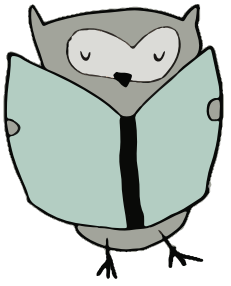

A. pay penitent

B. pay (pā) v. 1. To give to a person what is due for a debt, purchase, or work completed.
 2. To compensate. 3. To suffer the consequences.
 pay-ment (pā'ment) n. The act of paying.

ped-i-ment (ped i ment) n. A broad, triangular architectural or decorative part above a door.
 ped-o-meter (pe dom'it èr) n. An instrument which indicates the numbr of miles one has walked.

- A. Guide word. A word that shows the first or last item on that page.
- B. Entry word. A word that is the subject for an entry in a dictionary.
- C. Pronunciation. The way in which to speak the word.
- D. Part of speech. A category to which a word is assigned. These include:
 n. (noun) v. (verb) adj. (adjective) adv. (adverb),
 pron. (pronoun) conj. (conjunction) prep. (preposition) interj. (interjection).
- E. Definition. The meaning of the word.
- F. Alternative definition. Another definition; some words can have more than one meaning.
