
Election Conditions


Conditional sentences can show an if-then, cause-and-effect relationship. If one thing or event happens, then another thing or event can happen. But, the cause must happen for the effect to occur.

The person having the <u>greatest number of votes for President</u>, shall be the President if <u>such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed</u>.




1. If no person has such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President.



2. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President.



3. If no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President.



4. The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed.
