Facts and Opinions: Colonial America

People use both facts and opinions when talking about history. Here's how to tell the difference.

A **fact** is a true statement you can prove. Facts can be measured, observed, or looked up in official records.

An **opinion** is something a person believes, thinks, or feels. Opinions can't be proven true for everyone.

Take a look at examples of facts and opinions about colonial America:

In the Thirteen Colonies, most families lived in rural areas.

This statement is a **fact**. It can be proven by researching original housing documents from the 1700s.

In the Thirteen Colonies, it was better to live in rural areas than in cities.

This statement is an **opinion**. It is what one person thinks, and it can't be proven true for everyone.
