Identify Prepositions and Their Objects

A **preposition** is a connecting word. It comes before a noun or pronoun and connects it to the rest of the sentence. The noun or pronoun that comes after the preposition is called the **object of the preposition**.

Luca put his favorite shoes **under** the <u>bed</u>. **Under** is the preposition. It connects the object, <u>bed</u>, to the rest of the sentence.

Most prepositions tell about time, place, or movement.

Some common prepositions are about, above, across, after, around, behind, below, beside, by, down, during, from, inside, into, near, of, on, outside, over, through, under, and with.
