

Identify the Complete Subject of a Sentence

A complete sentence includes a complete subject and a complete predicate.

A **complete subject** tells who or what is doing something. A complete subject can be one word or more than one word.

One Word	More Than One Word
<u>Mia</u> told my favorite story.	<u>My cousin Mia</u> told my favorite story.
The complete subject is Mia .	The complete subject is my cousin Mia .

Each subject tells who told the story.
