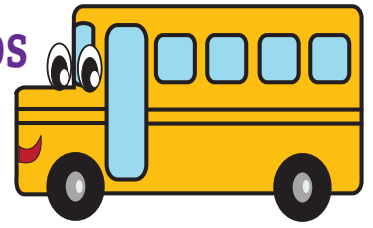


Identifying Personification with Nouns and Verbs



Personification is when you give human qualities or abilities to an object or animal. Authors use different parts of speech, like nouns and verbs, to write about things that are non-human as though they are human.

→ A **noun** is a person, place, thing, or idea. Here are some examples: *face, home, a dress.*

→ A **verb** is an action word. Here are some examples: *laughing, tripped, dive.*

Directions: Using the table below, determine which words in the word bank are *nouns* or *verbs* that can signal personification in a sentence. Then place the *nouns* and *verbs* in the T-chart and cross out any words that would not signal personification in a sentence.
