## **Identifying Vague Pronouns**

A **pronoun** takes the place of a noun in a sentence. That noun is called an **antecedent**. A pronoun is **vague** if you can't tell what the antecedent should be. For example, the pronoun could refer to more than one possible noun in the sentence. To keep your writing clear, you should avoid using vague pronouns.

## Example:

Emily uses vibrant colors to paint mountain landscapes, and they are beautiful.

The pronoun **they** is vague. It could refer to "colors" or "landscapes". Here are two ways to rewrite the sentence to avoid the vague pronoun:

Emily uses vibrant colors to paint mountain landscapes. Her paintings are beautiful.

OR

The vibrant colors in Emily's mountain landscape paintings are beautiful.
