



Irregular Verbs

You already know that you can add "ed" to make the past tense of most verbs. But this doesn't work with many verbs. These are called irregular verbs because they don't fit the regular pattern. This worksheet gives you practice forming the past and past participle tense of some important irregular verbs.

See example of one verb below.

drink (present) drank (past), drunk (past participle)

Yesterday, I **drank** a whole gallon of milk.

Whenever I **drink** soda I get bubbles up my nose.

That's the first time I have **drunk** that much milk in a single day.
