A **prediction**—based on an illustration or text clues—is a guess about what will happen next in the story. Active readers make predictions and support their predictions with evidence.

#### MAKING PREDICTIONS

Reflective readers make predictions:

#### **Before Reading**

We think about the title, information on the front and back of the book, illustrations, our personal experiences, and our background knowledge.
