A project proposal is a written document that you share with people whom you would like to be involved in your project. This might include local leaders, community members, or others who could donate time or resources. The project proposal outlines everything your audience should know about your project. The purpose of the proposal is to inform your audience about the project while also persuading them to help you with your goals.

Now write your own project proposal! Use the outline below and your notes from pages 1 and 2 to guide you. Use additional paper if needed.

- 1. Greeting: Who is your audience? Why are you reaching out to them?
- 2. Problem: Describe the issue that you want to address. Why is it important?
- 3. Solution: Explain your solution. What will you do to address the issue?
- 4. Action: Identify the specific steps you will take. What is your goal? What is the timeline for the project?
- 5. Request: What resources will you need to complete the project? What do you need from your audience?
- 6. Summary: Briefly summarize the goal of your project, and appeal to your audience for assistance.
