

Participles and Participial Phrases #2

A **participle** is a verb form that often acts as an **adjective** in a sentence. Participles and participial phrases (participles + all closely associated words) can modify nouns, noun phrases, or pronouns.



Present participles always end in **-ing**.

<p>The roar of the thundering waterfall drowned out the rafters' voices. The participle <i>thundering</i> modifies the noun <i>waterfall</i>.</p>	<p>Paddling in unison, the rafters maneuvered to the cave hidden behind the waterfall. The participial phrase <i>paddling in unison</i> modifies the noun phrase <i>the rafters</i>.</p>

Past participles usually end in **-ed**, just like the simple past tense of regular verbs.

<p>The community came together to help clean up the flooded businesses. The participle <i>flooded</i> modifies the noun <i>businesses</i>.</p>	<p>Abigail, inspired by her older siblings, helped to clean the library after the flood. The participial phrase <i>inspired by her older siblings</i> modifies the noun <i>Abigail</i>.</p>

Past participles made from irregular verbs may be unchanged from the base verb, or they may end in **-d, -t, -en, or -n**.

<p>The artist left written instructions for her son about how to sell her paintings. The participle <i>written</i> modifies the noun <i>instructions</i>.</p>	<p>Sold under odd circumstances, the painting disappeared, never to be seen again. The participial phrase <i>sold under odd circumstances</i> modifies the noun phrase <i>the painting</i>.</p>

10. The gardener proudly gestured toward the flame-orange flower of his blooming rosebushes.
