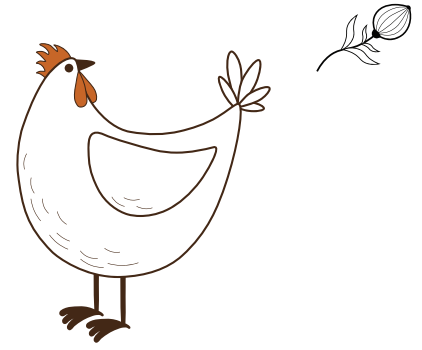


SINGULAR AND PLURAL POSSESSIVES

Place that **APOSTROPHE**



Possessive nouns show who or what owns something.

How to Change Nouns to Possessive Nouns:

SINGULAR NOUNS	PLURAL NOUNS	IRREGULAR PLURAL NOUNS
Add an apostrophe and then an s to the end of a noun.	Add an apostrophe after the s to the end of a plural noun.	Add an apostrophe and then an s to the end of an irregular plural noun.
's	'	's
chicken + 's = chicken's <i>The chicken's feathers are soft.</i>	boys + ' = boys' <i>The boys' hike went well.</i>	children + 's = children's <i>The children's garden grew.</i>
