



Predicate Adjectives

A predicate adjective is an adjective that modifies the subject of a sentence. Predicate adjectives are always linked to the subject by a linking verb.

Ex. The apple is red.

“Apple” is the noun, “red” is the predicate adjective, and “is” is the linking verb.

Ex. Joshua felt tired after his game.

“Joshua” is the noun, “tired” is the predicate adjective, and “felt” is the linking verb.
