

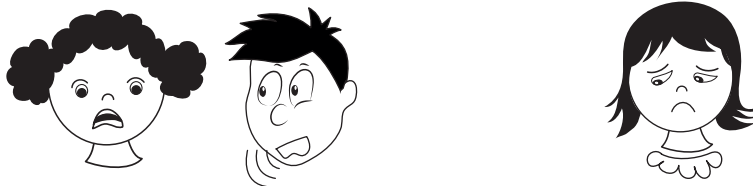
Seeing and Understanding Through Others' Eyes

Learn how to see situations from different perspectives by working together with your group.

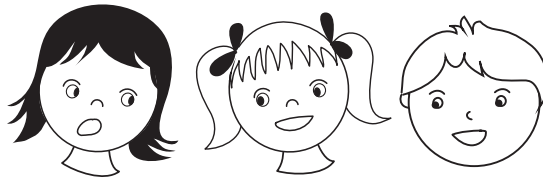
Decide which two people in your group will be on one side, and which two will be on another. Each side is underlined in the scenario. Flip a coin to see which character's point of view each group of partners will take on.

Read through the scenarios below. Then, with your partner, come up with all of the reasons why you have your perspective. Write down "I feel..." statements to share with the other group members about how you feel and your perspective.

Scenario 2: In Art class, a group of us were not following directions and were talking instead. The teacher asked us to leave the room, but I said that the other kids were talking, not me.
