Statue of Zeus at Olympia Seven Wonders of the Ancient World

Most statues honor a particular person we admire or want to remember. The Statue of Zeus at Olympia was a little different. It was built to show respect to the god of sky and thunder, at least according to the Ancient Greeks. Up on Mount Olympus, the supposed home of the gods, Zeus was the boss. He was the father of most of the gods and he could throw lightning bolts out of his hands. It was little wonder that the Ancient Greeks thought he deserved a truly impressive statue.

Around 432 BC, Greek sculptor Phidias stepped up to the challenge. He created a towering Zeus out ivory and gold-plated bronze that sat upon a throne of cedar wood. The entire statue was over 39 feet tall! Strabo, a visitor to the Temple of Zeus where the statue was displayed, observed that if Zeus were to stand up out of his throne, his head would break through the roof.



Sadly, this great statue was destroyed sometime during the 5th century AD. Hundreds of years later, we can only imagine what this magnificent wonder must have looked like.
