

Subject Nouns and Their Pronouns

A **subject** is who or what the sentence is about. The subject is usually a noun.

A **noun** is a person, place, thing, or idea.

A **pronoun (I, you, he, she, it, they, we)** is a word that takes the place of a noun or noun phrase.


Example: Robert likes to do magic tricks. He often practices at recess.
