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UNITED STATES THE PREAMBLE CONSTITUTION:



The 13 American colonies gained their independence from Great Britain in 1776. By 1787, delegates from each state met in Philadelphia at the Constitutional Convention to draft a constitution for a new government. The first part of the Constitution was called the **Preamble**. The Preamble provided the vision for the proposed government. Writing the Preamble was mainly the work of a man named Gouverneur Morris, who was a delegate representing Pennsylvania.

Read the Preamble below.

We the people of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.
