

VARY SENTENCE PATTERNS

Writing sentences with the same general length and structure can make a paragraph boring, choppy, or too difficult to read. Instead, vary your sentences by paying attention to word choice, tone, vocabulary, and sentence structure. Add some spice to your writing with the following tips:

- Include sentences of different lengths. You can combine short sentences into one, or cut longer ones into multiple sentences.
- Put prepositional phrases, modifiers, and dependent clauses in different places to shake things up a bit.
- Use a variety of conjunctions and transition words to add personality and flow to your sentences.
- Try not to start all your sentences the same way (e.g., subject followed by verb) or tag dialogue the same way every time (e.g., *"he said," "she said"*).

Give it a try! Rewrite these passages. Make them more interesting by adding variety in sentence length and structure.
