<p>I grew up in Chicago and that is where I continued my love of dance and studies in science. I joined the Peace Corps after earning a medical degree from Cornell Medical School. I traveled on the space shuttle <i>Endeavour</i>. That is when I became the first African American female astronaut to enter space.</p>	<p>Who am I?</p>
<p>I was a U.S. congressional representative from Texas. I was the first African American congresswoman to come from the Deep South. I worked to improve workers' rights. I wanted them to make a fair wage, or payment, for their work.</p>	<p>Who am I?</p>
<p>I was born a slave in Mississippi. Even though the United States created the Emancipation Proclamation, slaves in Mississippi were not free until after the Civil War. When I was finally free, I became a teacher and a journalist (someone who writes articles). I started my own newspaper called Free Speech. I wrote about racial segregation and discrimination. I was one of the founders of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).</p>	<p>Who am I?</p>
<p>I grew up in Mississippi and left school at the age of 12 to work on my family's land. When I got older, I worked with civil rights leaders. I helped African Americans register to vote. I also worked to help people and families that did not have a lot of money or food to eat. I set up organizations to give people business opportunities. My famous quote is: "I am sick and tired of being sick and tired."</p>	<p>Who am I?</p>
